Fight for Housing Fairness Hits City and State Legislatures



This winter, BCHS rallied alongside the Supportive Housing Network of New York and over 200 advocates and tenants of supportive housing organizations to meet with state legislators regarding critical issues in our industry.

As a coalition, we advocated for funding parity for the NYS Supportive Housing Program (NYSSHP) and Empire State Supportive Housing Initiative (ESSHI) programs, increased funding for capital projects through the Homeless Housing Assistance Program (HHAP), and initiatives as a part of the Just Pay campaign to ensure human services workers are adequately paid and human services contracts keep up with inflation. BCHS representatives, CEO Jeff Nemetsky and Communications & Policy Associate Vanessa Salman, met with staff from the offices of Senator Simcha Felder, Senator Zellnor Myrie,

Assemblymember Phara Souffrant Forrest, and Senator Toby Ann Stavisky to discuss the legislative priorities and how the legislators' support will help thousands of homeless and at-risk individuals and families find housing stability.

To ensure our voices are heard on the local level, BCHS also joined The Network for their 2nd Annual Virtual City Council Lobby Day. The day-long day of advocacy urged the Council to take action on funding for the investment in additional congregate housing units, the addition of peers to the city's B-HEARD

mental health crisis response team, ensuring justice-involved individuals have access to housing by investing in the Justice Involved Supportive Housing (JISH) program, and supporting the financial health of nonprofits by requiring city agencies to reimburse organizations for interest due to late contract payments. BCHS representatives Chief Development Officer Emma Williams and Communications & Policy Associate Vanessa Salman, met with staff from the offices of Council Members Crystal Hudson, Sandy Nurse, and Lynn Schulman to discuss these critical issues facing supportive housing organizations across New York City.



BCHS Leader Finds Her Voice in Mentorship Program

This past December, our Director of Creative Arts, Therapeutic Activities, and Engagement Ajanae Lewis completed the Readying Emerging Leaders in Supportive Housing (RELISH) program. RELISH is a professional development and mentorship program for emerging Black leaders in the homelessness and housing industry created by the Racial Equity in Supportive Housing (RESH) workgroup, comprised of nonprofit leaders in the supportive housing industry created through the Supportive Housing Network of New York.

"RELISH is well worth the experience. It provided me the opportunity and space to sit with other Black emerging leaders in Supportive Housing. It was a safe learning environment for myself and my peers, where we were able to learn valuable skills as we grow in the field. I want to thank Wendy (Junious, BCHS' Chief Program Officer) and Jeff (Nemetsky, BCHS' CEO) for the continued support in seeing my strengths and growth within the agency. RELISH has given me the tools to navigate as I strengthen my voice in advocating for our residents," said Ajanae on her experience in the 24-week program.





A message from Chief Executive Officer Jeff Nemetsky

Dear friends,

Teddy is a 63-year-old formerly homeless man who lives at Oak Hall, one of BCHS' permanent supportive housing residences. An abuse survivor who struggled with trauma and schizophrenia for many years, Teddy began to heal and thrive once he had a stable place to live and on-site help. He has also become a well-informed consumer of political news, and we often talk about current events and U.S. and world history.

Usually upbeat and friendly, Teddy approached me a few weeks ago with worry and deep concern. "Jeff," he asked nervously, "what happens if the Federal government cuts BCHS' funding. We'd have to close, right?"

I didn't hesitate. "No," I said, "absolutely not. No matter what, we'll find a way, I promise." We shook hands and Teddy smiled, then made his way back to his apartment.

Just as Teddy identified, these are extremely uncertain times. Proposed budget cuts and sudden policy shifts are putting lifesaving programs at risk, leaving families and individuals feeling vulnerable and scared.

But at BCHS, we feel privileged to stand with so many compassionate friends and supporters like you, whose goodwill, generosity, and thoughtfulness is a bulwark that makes it possible for us to sustain the agency's lifesaving work, every day.

The COVID-19 pandemic, the Great Recession, 9/11 – no matter the circumstances, our BCHS team has never wavered in its work, empowering thousands of people in need to move from crisis to community each year.

As we consider the days and months ahead, the one thing I know for sure is that **we will continue to do what we have always done:** roll up our sleeves with resilience and resolve, while deepening our commitment to safeguarding the dignity, rights, and independence of our residents, colleagues, and neighbors.

Together, we will continue the fight to end homelessness – once and for all.

Expanding Our Impact

BCHS is expanding into East New York! With a completion date estimated for Spring 2026, 2435 Pacific Street will soon open its doors with 240+ new units of affordable and supportive housing. This development will include 71 units for formerly homeless families where the head of household has a mental illness.

The project team, which includes co-developer Alembic Community Development along with Love Fellowship Tabernacle Church, has prioritized energy efficiency in the development and will use geothermal heat pumps as a sustainable energy source for the building, ensuring long-term cost savings. This cutting-edge clean energy technology leverages the stable belowground temperature of the earth to cool and heat the building, which will significantly lower electricity consumption.

Last Spring, Love Fellowship Tabernacle hosted a groundbreaking for the project, which was widely attended by city officials and members of the community in support of the project's progress. Stay tuned!



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
